


CONTEXT & CHALLENGES

Since 2011, the Assad regime's brutal crackdown of peaceful protests by the Syrian people for their rights and freedom has resulted in around 1 million deaths, hundreds of thousands of people detained, and millions displaced around the world. The humanitarian crisis has deteriorated after years of failed international intervention, decreased funding, and the normalization efforts by several countries that propped up the regime's machinery of death and made hope for a democratic future in Syria bleak.

SETF has strived for the ending of the killing and atrocities in Syria through advocacy, accountability, justice, and humanitarian work. SETF has helped pass important legislation to deter the regime and its allies; we have exposed many of the crimes committed by the regime, including mass torture and killing (documented by Caesar's 55,000 photos) and mass graves; we have brought multiple witnesses to testify in front of several institutions and government officials; we have empowered civil society on the ground through humanitarian initiatives, including schools for displaced civilians and support for Rukban IDP camp.

On December 8, 2024, SETF's mission to end the killing was achieved with the liberation from the Assad regime and its allies, Iran and Russia. However, challenges remain as an inexperienced government took over and is now trying to rebuild the country from the ground up while dealing with external factors, such as misinformation campaigns led by Iran and Russia and sanctions which prevent foreign investments and economic growth while the vast majority of the population is in desperate need of help. Despite the joy and immediate relief brought about by the liberation and the widespread hope for a better future, the regime and its allies left the country in shambles and a deteriorating humanitarian crisis, with nearly 70% of the population dependent on foreign aid.

Just as the situation on the ground is ever changing, so too has SETF adjusted its objectives, directly informed and inspired by the Syrian people.



VISION & MISSION

Mission

In 2024, SETF's mission focused on ending the killing in Syria, advancing democracy through strategic advocacy, promoting accountability, and delivering humanitarian support to empower the Syrian people in their pursuit of a free and democratic future.

Following Syria's liberation, SETF is committed to building a democratic future by advancing strategic advocacy, supporting transitional justice and accountability, driving humanitarian and development initiatives, and helping the Syrian people secure a peaceful and inclusive future for all.

Vision

SETF envisions a prosperous, stable, and democratic Syria that serves as a beacon of justice, accountability, and freedom, supporting its people and standing firm against authoritarianism.



WHAT WE DO

As we reflect on 2024—a year marked by both historic change and profound loss—we remain guided by a clear vision: a free, democratic, and prosperous Syria rooted in justice, accountability, and human dignity. The Syrian Emergency Task Force (SETF) is committed to supporting the Syrian people in their enduring aspiration to live in safety, freedom, and peace after more than a decade of devastating war. Our mission is to help communities recover, rebuild, and heal—whether through advocating for justice, delivering life-saving humanitarian aid, supporting development efforts, or walking alongside families as they search for answers about missing loved ones. SETF stands with Syrians as they reclaim their future and lay the foundation for a Syria where all people can thrive.



1. Advocacy

- Keeping policymakers aware of the situation on the ground through meetings, briefings, and witness testimonies.
- Engaging with Congress, the White House, the State Department and others to push for policy that better supports the Syrian people.
- Engaging with other governments and international institutions to push for policy that better supports the Syrian people.
- Promoting legislation that supports the Syrian people's aspirations for stability and democracy.
- Communicating to the public the reality of events on the ground through media coverage, always aiming to communicate the truth and keeping in mind the best interest of the Syrian people.

2. Justice & Accountability

- Helping Syrian authorities develop plans for accountability that align with international standards and preserve evidence of the crimes of the Assad regime to criminal law standards.
- Raising awareness on the crimes of the regime and the evidence left behind to push for action that will lead to accountability efforts.
- Supporting ongoing cases against the Assad regime in the US and in Europe and encouraging others to come forward and advocate for more cases to be opened.
- Supporting new and existing witnesses of crimes in Syria.

3. Humanitarian

- Operate educational institutions in Syria for children and women that empower Syria's future leaders.
- Respond to emergency humanitarian situations in Syria affecting the most vulnerable communities by coordinating with relevant organizations to find solutions to bring relief.
- Foster friendships around the world by connecting communities and volunteers to Syrians to bring engagement and support through grass-roots initiatives.

MEDIA & SOCIAL MEDIA

During 2024, SETF achieved significant impact in both media coverage and social media outreach. SETF facilitated and/or was featured in over 150 news stories throughout the year, including a major media blitz in December following Syria's liberation. Coverage spanned key topics such as the advancement of legal cases related to Assad regime victims and war criminals, the situation in Rukban and Al-Tanf Garrison, the Captagon crisis, anti-normalization efforts, and political and humanitarian developments inside Syria.

SETF also served as a primary resource and point of contact for numerous journalists, offering accurate, on-the-ground information and helping facilitate safe reporting trips into Syria. In addition to earned media, SETF continued to amplify Syrian voices through digital storytelling, reaching millions via social media and growing its follower base by over 200% in 2024 alone.

MEDIA

While over 150 articles and news stories were facilitated by SETF in 2024, the exact number is likely even higher—especially during the intense media surge that followed the fall of Assad's regime. At the height of this period, SETF was fielding interviews and requests from more than 20 journalists per day, often without the capacity to track every published story.

The coverage spanned a wide range of critical topics: Syria's liberation from Assad's rule; the uncovering of mass graves tied to regime atrocities; personal stories of victims, including SETF's beloved friend Mazen al-Hamada; the breaking of the siege in Rukban and continued aid delivery; and the successful resolution of Kevin Dawes' case. Media also focused on raising awareness around key legislative efforts such as the Anti-Normalization Act, the Captagon Act, and the Caesar Act extension. Additional attention was given to the legal case of Majd Kamalmaz's family following confirmation of his death in Assad's detention centers, the arrest of war criminal Samir Ousman al Sheikh in Los Angeles, and commentary on U.S. political figures—such as Tulsi Gabbard—regarding their positions on Syria and ties to the Assad regime.

Throughout 2024, SETF remained a trusted voice exposing Assad regime atrocities, providing first-hand information and direct witness accounts to the media and global audiences. In December, during the fall of the Assad regime, SETF worked closely with minority and religious groups to monitor the situation, coordinated safe access for international journalists, and ensured the world heard directly from Syrians on the ground. Amid confusion and disinformation, SETF amplified Syrians' voices—most of whom expressed jubilation and cautious optimism, noting improved services, more freedom, and greater safety with Assad gone.

POLICY & ADVOCACY

SETF has a strong track record of impactful advocacy and policy engagement, working closely with governments and organizations to champion human rights in Syria.

We consistently provide briefings to Members of Congress and their bipartisan staff, engaging with various government departments in Washington, D.C. and in other capitals. Our discussions focus on the latest developments in Syria and the surrounding region, fostering collaboration on legislative initiatives.

Through our advocacy events like Caesar exhibits, policy roundtables, and panels held globally, we actively reach out to the general public. These initiatives aim to create grassroots movements that enhance and complement our direct advocacy efforts.

ADVOCACY PRIORITIES

01

Government Engagement

SETF regularly collaborates with Congressional offices, Government departments in Washington, D.C. and their European counterparts to provide briefings on the latest developments on the ground in Syria and in the region and offer consultations on policy. We also work closely with law enforcement to build court cases to fulfill the Syrian people's need for justice and accountability.

02

Advocacy and Accountability Events

SETF organizes numerous advocacy and accountability events in the US and abroad to bring the attention of policymakers and the general public to the situation in Syria and the importance of accountability for all crimes against civilians. We regularly host briefings and hearings to advocate for a free, democratic, stable and thriving Syria.

03

Media Exposure

SETF collaborates with various media outlets to highlight current events and issues in Syria and offer context and commentary on Syria policy and initiatives. We consistently publish statements and press releases addressing human rights violations and detailing our policy and accountability achievements.

04

Key Witnesses

SETF has worked with whistleblowers and eyewitnesses to atrocities in Syria for over a decade, helping them escape the regime and seek asylum, and then share their testimonies. After the liberation of Syria from the Assad regime in December 2024, we are helping these witnesses uncover their identities and finally speak to policymakers, to the media, and to the general public without masks.

Justice and Accountability

SETF is identifying conflict victims to bring closure to families. Our team, including board member Ambassador Stephen Rapp, visited mass grave sites in Damascus, advocating for evidence preservation and international forensic experts to identify victims among 150,000 forcibly disappeared Syrians.

In 2024, the SETF team hosted and participated in over 6 events across the world. Our team gave dozens of presentations to tens of thousands of students and community members at universities, high schools, rotary clubs, and houses of worship, featuring keynote speakers such as Ambassador Rapp, Congressman French Hill, Omar Alshogre, Natalie Larrison, Sullivan Gaudreault, and Mouaz Moustafa.



THE CAESAR EXHIBITS

The Caesar File is a collection of 55,000 photos depicting men, women, children, and the elderly who were brutally tortured and killed by the Assad regime inside prisons. As custodians of the Caesar File, SETF works to expose the regime's flagrant human rights violations by continuing to identify victims, witnesses, and evidence that support accountability cases against the regime.

In 2024, SETF hosted a Caesar Exhibit and panel discussion in Denmark, continuing its decade-long effort to raise global awareness about the Assad regime's atrocities. Over the past ten years, SETF has organized dozens of Caesar Exhibits across the world to shed light on the regime's system of torture and mass detention. These events serve as powerful platforms for advocating justice on behalf of the hundreds of thousands of victims and their families.

Without SETF, Caesar's bravery would have had nowhere near the impact that it had.

SETF also provided the key aid and protection to other witnesses such as the Gravedigger and the Bulldozer Divers and found, through its research, the corroboration with satellite imagery of the mass graves, bringing that evidence to the New York Times and other media and showing the machinery of death that continued to grind out its victims until the very end.

HUMANITARIAN

SETF operated four programs in 2024 that reflect the much larger humanitarian crisis, and we responded to immediate needs reaching residents in the forgotten Rukban camp.

In 2024, the humanitarian situation worsened for civilians in Syria as the regime continued to displace, detain, and attack civilians. SETF's main humanitarian programs provided support for the most vulnerable, including orphans, widows, children, and internally displaced persons (IDPs). These critical programs eased some of the massive and widespread suffering Syrians endure. They provide hope and build bridges between Syrians on the ground and the world.


OUR HUMANITARIAN PROGRAMS

Tomorrow's Dawn High School for Girls

A tuition-free secondary high school for 85 women and girls who missed education due to resource scarcity and displacement. The school offers accredited diplomas.

House of Healing

A home away from home for internally-displaced Syrians with critical medical conditions, most due to war, allowed to enter Turkey temporarily for treatment.



Rukban Hope Pharmacy

The only no-cost pharmacy serves as the camp's only regular source of essential medicine, baby milk, first-aid, and life-saving supplies.

Wisdom House Kindergarten

A Kindergarten for displaced children in the Aleppo countryside where six amazing teachers provide education and a nurturing environment to 138 students.

In June 2024, the 8th class of kindergarteners at Wisdom House celebrated their graduation, marking the culmination of their early education journey with a total of 138 students.

The new class commenced in September 2024, welcoming 151 students, reflecting a notable **13% increase in enrollment from the previous year**.

Notably, half of the new students are displaced individuals, underlining the school's commitment to serving diverse communities. The new academic year also heralded a significant development as the Wisdom House relocated to a larger space with six classrooms and an outdoor space for activities. The Wisdom House is the most popular school in the area because of the high quality education it provides children.

TOMORROW'S DAWN

Tomorrow's Dawn is a secondary school that offers courses at no cost for women and girls who have missed years of education due to lack of resources and displacement. Students follow the literary or science degree path and graduate with an accredited diploma. SETF has operated women's educational initiatives in northwest Syria since 2017.

In July 2024, the second class of 85 students at Tomorrow's Dawn High School for girls successfully completed their academic year. The Class of 2024/2025 began in August with 85 seniors, mostly displaced women and girls.

The Tomorrow's Dawn Women's Education Center has ten teachers and three staff, and offers **courses in Arabic, History, Philosophy, Geography, Chemistry, Physics, English, Religion, and Math**. Graduates receive their high school diploma, leading to increased economic opportunities, higher education, and improvements in mental, emotional, and social well-being. The school year leads to the students taking their final exams, a rigorous assessment that enables their eligibility to attend a university.



HOUSE OF HEALING

1,200

House of Healing is a sanctuary for internally displaced Syrians facing critical medical conditions, providing care and support to approximately 100 patients each month. Located in Turkey, the facility welcomes groups of patients from inside Syria during their temporary stay for urgent medical treatment. Services include food, shelter, transportation, and help navigating the healthcare system ensure that patients receive the care they need with dignity.

Since 2019, the House of Healing has served thousands of patients and helped find financial assistance for patients to access life-saving medical treatment for conditions such as heart disease, cancer, burns, amputations, and blindness. A classroom also offers educational lessons to children staying at the facility.

In the spring of 2024, Global Justice partnered with SETF to support the House of Healing, enabling the program to continue providing care to Syrian patients throughout the year. SETF also facilitated visits from several U.S.-based professors and volunteers, who spent time at the facility to offer support, share expertise, and connect with patients on the ground.



RUKBAN CAMP

In the summer of 2024, the humanitarian crisis in Rukban Camp reached a critical point. The 8,000 residents were on the brink of starvation as the siege imposed by the Assad regime, Iran, and Russia intensified, cutting off nearly all access to food and essential supplies. The situation grew increasingly dire by the day.

A turning point came when SETF successfully coordinated the delivery of 720,000lbs of food aid—enough to provide every one of the 1,600 families in the camp with a food basket lasting 2 to 3 months.

To ensure fair and organized distribution, SETF's ground team conducted a full camp census, then hired trusted drivers and local distributors to deliver the food directly to each household. This large-scale operation was made possible through coordination with the U.S. military, which transported the aid on a space-available basis.

This mission brought critical relief and a renewed sense of hope to a community that had long been isolated and under siege.

SETF provides Rukban camp's sole no-cost pharmacy that caters to the pharmaceutical requirements of 80% of Rukban's roughly 8,000 residents, serving approximately 40-50 individuals daily and up to 90 on particularly busy days.

The pharmacy offers essential medications such as antibiotics, treatments for chronic conditions, diabetes, hypertension, baby formula, and diapers.

DOCTORS FOR RUKBAN

SETF could not stand by when Rukban residents became desperate for doctors as more people's ailments were going untreated, leaving devastating consequences. Rukban camp had not seen a doctor in years. With great effort, SETF was finally able to bring doctors into the camp with the assistance of the U.S. military on space-available flights to al-Tanf Garrison, situated on the outskirts of Rukban camp in Southeast Syria. Delegations of doctors worked in the camps' only makeshift hospital, Sham Clinic, with the assistance of the experienced local nurses.

Primary care for adult and children don't exist. There are huge deficits in the assessment of the public health services. Common health conditions are surrounding chronic untreated conditions that otherwise would have been electively treated like tonsillectomy, adenoidectomy, hernia repairs, vaccines, common skin and respiratory diseases, malnutrition.

Dr. Majed, a dedicated dentist, spent over a month in Rukban providing compassionate care, treating every patient as if they were family. In addition to offering clinical care, he spent several days teaching students about dental hygiene. During his time in the camp, he saw 330 patients and treated over 639 teeth, delivering both healing and hope to a community long deprived of medical services.

LETTERS OF HOPE

SETF started the Letters of Hope Program in 2016 to let Syrians who are suffering from conflict and displacement know that they are not forgotten. The goal of Letters of Hope is to create a connection between the international community and the Syrian children and families who reside in Syria so that they may exchange messages and letters of hope and encouragement.

As we reflect on the recent liberation of Syria, it is important to recognize that the need for solidarity and hope persists. Though the war may have ended, many families continue to face issues of rebuilding their lives, recovering from trauma, and gaining access to basic services. The Letters of Hope initiative is a powerful reminder that they are not alone as they embark on the journey of reconstruction and hope.

SETF emphasizes the importance of these connections and the ongoing commitment to amplifying the voices of children and families in Syria has proven to be since 2016. By continuing to exchange letters of hope, we foster resilience and a sense of belonging without borders, repeating the message that every individual is heard and supported.

The original Wisdom House building is destroyed, but after liberation our team was able to visit and documented surviving Letters of Hope that remain on the walls. SETF plans to rebuild the Wisdom House in 2025.

Dr. Riva Brown, SETF-UCA Chapter Committee Chair and SETF volunteer, traveled with the team to Gaziantep, Turkey and gave Letters of Hope to displaced Syrian children in September 2024.



COMMUNITY AND EDUCATION PARTNERS

In 2024, SETF expanded its outreach and educational initiatives through a robust network of community and education partners. This collaboration aimed to raise awareness about the situation and humanitarian crisis in Syria and engage students and community members in advocacy and fundraising efforts.

Various universities and schools have established student chapters to mobilize peers, organize events, and promote discussions around Syrian issues. The goals of these partnerships focus on advocacy, awareness, and fundraising. Partners engage in campaigns to inform their communities about the realities in Syria, emphasizing the importance of humanitarian aid and justice. SETF also organized workshops, presentations, and discussions to educate students and community members about the history and current situation in Syria. Collaborative fundraising efforts aim to support SETF's humanitarian programs, including initiatives like the "Letters of Hope" campaigns, which fosters connection between communities and families in Syria. Through these partnerships, SETF is empowering the next generation to take action and advocate for human rights and democracy in Syria, fostering a sense of global citizenship among students and community members.

The SETF-UCA Chapter received the **2024 Service-learning Partner of the Year Award** from the University of Central Arkansas thanks to our incredible collaboration with professors and students. The SETF-UCA Committee Chair, Dr. Riva Brown, leads monthly meetings with the SETF team for collaboration on many activities on campus for the Syrian cause.

SOUP FOR SYRIA



On Sunday, September 29th, community members gathered at the First United Methodist Church of Conway for a fundraising event, Soup for Syria. organized in partnership with the UCA Honors College and the local Rotary Club, the event raised over **\$15,000** to support SETF's humanitarian initiatives for the Syrian people. Approximately 130 attendees enjoyed a variety of soups prepared by local volunteers, purchased handmade clothing crafted by widows in war-torn Syria, and wrote heartfelt Letters of Hope.

Congressman French Hill of Arkansas attended and spoke at the event, reaffirming his longstanding leadership in Congress on Syrian relief efforts and his active involvement in local humanitarian initiatives for Syria over the years.

In late summer 2024, the siege on Rukban Camp escalated, cutting residents off from essential supplies and humanitarian access. In response, volunteers from diverse community groups mobilized to raise emergency funds for critical items including medicine, baby formula, school supplies, and support for incoming medical delegations. These grassroots efforts raised approximately **\$18,000** - becoming the sole source of aid reaching Rukban during its most desperate time.



PARTNERSHIPS & COLLABORATIONS

SETF has further enhanced its mission in 2024 by establishing strategic alliances and cooperations with various influential bodies that pledge themselves to human rights and humanitarian assistance. By collaborating with these powerful allies, SETF runs programs that address the key challenges facing displaced individuals in Syria within the Rukban Camp and northwestern Syria. These partnerships reinforce advocacy efforts, emphasizing documentation of human rights abuses and efforts for accountability.

Additionally, SETF collaborates with institutions to offer comprehensive support to affected communities, achieving both short-term relief and long-term development goals. Collective efforts also enhance advocacy activities, raising international awareness and action to promote justice and humanitarian principles in Syria, amplifying SETF's impact, ensuring a collective response to one of the world's most pressing humanitarian crises.



THE LIBERATION OF SYRIA

Syria is entering of a new era, having come out of over 50 years of brutal dictatorship marked by mass killings and displacement. With the new transitional government, Syria aims to establish a democratic environment that focuses on writing a new constitution and ensures the protection and inclusion of all Syrians. This major opportunity enables the country to rebuild its economy and remove longstanding foreign influences, such as Iran and Russia, for good. The counter-terrorism campaign against ISIS remains a priority for the new government, which has already taken significant steps to eliminate the threat ISIS poses to broader regional stability and security.





SETF is dedicated to supporting Syria's journey on its path towards freedom and democracy. By advocating for the lifting of sanctions that hinder Syria's ability to rebuild, SETF reiterates that easing these sanctions is vital in allowing displaced Syrians to return home and build lasting peace. SETF strives actively against misinformation and in favor of good news reporting about Syria's evolving situation.

As SETF's executive director, Mouaz Moustafa, stated:

"Engaging directly with the new government in Damascus is crucial to preventing the resurgence of Iranian influence and ensuring the continued defeat of ISIS."



Through its initiatives, SETF is not only striving to build a brighter future for Syrians but is also reinforcing the importance of a stable, democratic Syria for the broader region.

The [Syria Watch mobile application](#) is a SETF project that provides users with real-time notifications of attacks launched against civilian/IDP targets in Syria.




536 Documented attacks in 2024

2024 Financial Overview

In 2024, the Syrian Emergency Task Force exceeded its annual budget—an outcome driven by urgent and unprecedented humanitarian operations in the besieged Rukban Camp. As the siege tightened and conditions inside the camp deteriorated, basic necessities such as food, medicine, and medical care became increasingly scarce for the 8,000 residents. In response, SETF made the critical decision to invest in delivering doctors, medical equipment, and lifesaving supplies into the camp, bringing much-needed relief to a community on the brink.

While these efforts pushed our financial resources beyond our planned limits, we could not turn away from such a clear and immediate call to action. This chapter of SETF's work embodies our commitment to respond to humanitarian needs—no matter the cost.

As a small but dedicated team, SETF continues to stretch every resource to meet the evolving needs on the ground. However, we recognize that we have not allocated enough time or energy to strengthen our own infrastructure or expand our funding base. In 2025, we are seeking to grow our partnerships and build a broader community of support that will allow us to deepen our impact, sustain our mission, and continue standing with the people of Syria.
